**QUARTERLY EVOLUTION OF THE SELECTED
MACROECONOMIC INDICATORS
AT THE END OF AUGUST 2014**

I. INTRODUCTION

The selected macroeconomic indicators, hereafter mentioned, depict the evolution of real sector and prices, public finances, external sector as well as broad money and its counterparts.

Year on Year, the real sector has been characterized by an increase of industrial production, the volume of coffee and tea production. The overall budget deficit increased further, the trade balance worsened and the growth of money supply accelerated.

II. PRODUCTION

Compared to the previous month, the main indicators of real sector overall improved in august 2014. In fact, the industrial production increased and the parchment coffee production rose with respect to those of July 2014. Year on Year, the cumulative production of tea and coffee rose also.

Industrial Production Index

In August 2014, Industrial production increased compared to the previous month. In fact, the industrial production index rose by 1.7 pc, from 179.0 to 182.1 mainly due to the increase of the production of BRARUDI beverages (3.8 pc) and of sugar (8.8 pc).

Likewise, year on year, the index rose by 5.2 pc mainly due to the increase in the production of BRARUDI beverages (11.0 pc) and sugar (6.9 pc).

Coffee

The production of parchment Arabica coffee of the 2014/2015 campaign reached 15,452 in august 2014 against 8,202 Tons at the same period in 2013; say an increase of 88.4 pc.

Tea

The production of tea leaves in august 2014 dropped by 25.1 p.c compared to the previous month, falling from 2,344 to 1,755 Tons due to the dry season. However, the cumulative production of the eight last months rose by 9.9 p.c., reaching 33,520 against 30,513 Tons with respect to the same period of last year.

III. CONSUMER PRICE INDEX

In august 2014, the overall consumer index registered an increase of 5.9 p.c., from 98.4 to 104.2, compared to the same period of 2013. This inflation is due to the increase of non-food price (+8.0 p.c.) and, to some extent, to food price (+0.9 p.c.)

The non-food inflation is explained by the price increase of the products like "clothing and footwear" (+12.9 p.c.), "housing, water, electricity, gas and other fuels (+11.4 p.c.), furnishing, household equipment and routine household maintenance" (+12.8 p.c.), health (+10.5 p.c.), Transport (+ 5.8 p.c.), Recreation and Culture" (+3.5 p.c.), Hotels, Restaurants and catering" (+8.3 p.c.), and Miscellaneous goods and services" (+8.3 p.c.).

Compared to the previous month, the prices increased by 1.2 p.c. due especially to the increase of price of non-food products (2.4 p.c.) whereas prices of food products decreased (-0.3 p.c.).

The rise of the price of non-food products is related to "Alcoholic beverages and tobacco" (+0.7 p.c.)," clothing and footwear" (+2.8 p.c.), "Housing, water, electricity, gas and other fuels" (+4.4 p.c.), "Furnishing, household equipment and routine household maintenance" (+3.3 p.c.), "Health"(+4.9 p.c.), Hotels, café and catering"(+1.6 p.c) and "Miscellaneous goods and services" (+0.1 p.c.).

IV. PUBLIC FINANCE

The situation of Public Finance at the end of August 2014 still gives way to concern. The amount of revenue remained below that of expenses and the Public debt increased.

Revenue

At the end of August 2014, the total fiscal revenue amounted to BIF 403,519.9 against 367,214.7 Million for the same period in the preceding year, denoting a 9.9 p.c. increase or BIF 36,305.2 Million in nominal terms. This increase was due to the rise in tax revenue (+BIF 9,932.2 Million, non-tax revenue (+BIF 24,270.5 Million) and exceptional receipts (+BIF 2,102.6 Million).

Month on month, public revenue as of August 2014 increased by BIF 5,482.6 Million up from BIF 48,042.0 to 53,524.6 Million due to the increase in tax revenue (+BIF 3,672.7 Million) and non-tax revenue (+ BIF 1,900.1 Million) whereas exceptional receipts slightly decreased by BIF 90, 2 Million.

Expenses

Total expenses as of the end of August 2014 stood at BIF 699,416.3 against 589,216.5 Million the same period in 2013, which represents a 18.7 p.c. increase. Expenses committed as compensation of employees amounted to BIF 206,606.9 against 194,327.2 Million in 2013, a 6.3 p.c. increase on cumulative basis.

Public debt

Year on year, the stock of Public debt expanded by 13.1 p.c., standing at BIF 1,359,460.2 Million at the end of August 2014, compared to BIF 1,201,776.1 Million registered in august 2013; explained by the increase in domestic debt and external debt respectively by 16.5 and 9.9 pc. Month on month, the stock of Public debt slightly increased by BIF 255.2 Million due to the increase of external debt (+BIF 3,259.1 Million) partly offset by the decrease in domestic debt (-BIF 3,003.8 Million).

-Domestic debt

Year on year, the stock of domestic debt expanded by BIF 97,520.3 Million from BIF 591,175.7 Million in August 2013 up to BIF 688,696.0 Million in August 2014. This increase is associated with the expansion of Government debt to banking sector and (+ BIF 88,232.0 Million) and non-banking sector (+ BIF 9,288.3 Million).

The increase in Public debt to banking sector, resulted from increased Government securities held by the commercial banks (+BIF 56,392.1 Million) and the rise in budget financing from the Central Bank (+BIF 39,352.9 Million). However Government liabilities to the Postal Cheque Account decreased by BIF 7,513.1 Million.

Month on month, the stock of domestic debt dropped by BIF 3,003.8 Million with respect to that of the previous month, declining from BIF 691,699.8 to 688,696.0 Million due to the fall in Government debt to the non-banking sector (-BIF 6.381.2 Million) that has outweighed the increase in Public debt to banking sector (+BIF 3.377.4 Million).

The increase in public debt to the banking sector resulted from the rise in Government debt to commercial banks (+BIF 13,414.9 Million), whereas the debt held on the Central bank decreased by BIF 10.037,5 Million.

-External debt

Year on year, the stock of external debt increased by BIF 60,164.3 Million, from BIF 610,600.4 Million at the end of August 2013 to BIF 670,764.8 Million registered at the same period in 2014. This increase was due to drawings on external loans that amounted to BIF 54,527.1 Million and revaluation surpluses of BIF 14,974.2 Million, slightly attenuated by repayments of BIF 9,337.0 Million.

Month on month, the stock of Public external debt augmented by BIF 3,259.1 Million, from BIF 667,505.7 to 670,764.8 Million due to new drawings on external loans of BIF 7,217.8 Million that outweighed revaluation losses of BIF 3.928,8 Million and repayments of BIF 29,9 Million.

Drawings made in August 2014 were allocated to the Post conflict program cofounded by IFAD and OPEC for BIF 100.6 Million and BIF 1,379.3 Million respectively. The latter also financed the programs of Agricultural Value Chain development for BIF 982.4 Million, the construction of roads, Bubanza-Ndora segment for BIF 3,997.4 Million and Ntamba-Ndora segment for BIF 561.6 Million. Another BIF 196.4 Million was drawn to finance the hydropower plant KABU 16 by Exim bank.

Converted in USD, the stock of external debt increased by 9.3 pc at the end of August 2014, reaching 433.4 against 396.7 MUSD amounted in August 2013.

V. MONETARY BASE, BROAD MONEY AND COUNTERPARTS

Year on year, the growth of monetary base decelerated and stated at 17.0 p.c. in august 2014 against 25.6 p.c. registered at the end of august 2013. Likewise, broad money decelerated, from 16.2 to 13.2 p.c. in connection with the decrease of domestic credit (13.3 VS 14.7 p.c.) and the net foreign assets (-11.0 VS 18.6 p.c.).

Monetary base

Year on year, the reserves money (BIF 338,034.8 VS 288,866.1 million) increased by BIF 49,168.7 million, or 17.0 p.c. in link with the rise of banking sector deposits (BIF 28,680.8 million), currency in circulation (BIF 26,056.3 million) and other deposits (BIF 4,647.4 million). On the other hand, the deposits of public non-financial corporations (BIF -4,677.1 million), micro finance deposits (BIF -4,339.4 million) and other deposits of financial intermediaries (BIF -1,192. million) decreased.

Broad money

Compared to august 2013, the broad money M3 (BIF 1,027,276.2 VS 907,452.3 million) has increased by BIF 119,823.9 million, or 13.2 p.c. at the end of august 2014 in connection with the growth of the components of M2 (BIF 95,116.3 million) and the foreign deposits of residents (BIF 24,707.6 million).

The growth of broad money M2 concerned narrow money (BIF 51,214.3 million) and time deposits (BIF 43,902.0 million). The rise of the

aggregate M1 is due to demand deposits (BIF 32,456.7 million) and the currency in circulation outside banks (BIF 18,757.6 million).

The rise of demand deposits concerned household deposits (BIF 8,058.3 million), other non-financial corporations deposits (BIF 30,057.2 million) and local government deposits (BIF 713.9 million) that were offset by lower deposits of public non-financial corporations (BIF -4,920.7 million), deposits classified in other accounts (BIF -937.5 million) and other deposits of financial intermediaries (BIF -514.5 million). The increase of time deposits is related to that of household deposits (BIF 31,616.7 million), other non-financial corporations deposits (BIF 11,503.8 million) and the deposits classified in other accounts (BIF 6,311.7 million). On the other hand, the time deposits of public non-financial corporations and other financial intermediaries decreased by BIF 5,366.8 million and BIF 150.0 million respectively.

The foreign deposits for residents increased by BIF 24,707.6 million in connection with the rise of other non-financial corporation deposits (BIF 7,583.6 million) and deposits classified in other accounts (BIF 23,333.4 million). On the other hand, household deposits and public nonfinancial corporation deposits decreased by BIF 3,341.5 million and BIF 2,809.9 million respectively.

Counterparts

From august 2013 to august 2014, domestic credit increased by BIF 133,760.2 million, or 13.3 p.c., rising from BIF 1,009,508.2 million to BIF 1,143,268.1 million. This rise resulted in the increase of net claims on government (BIF 93,441.3 million) and claims on economy (BIF 40,318.9 million).

The growth of net government debt is mainly due to the increase of the Treasury bills and bonds stocks held by commercial banks (BIF 60,686.9 million) and the central bank overdrafts (BIF 39,352.9 million).

The progress of claims on economy mainly concerned the long term financing (BIF 42,627.9 million), the exports credits (BIF 7,142.1 million), the cash loans (BIF 3,814.6 million) and the other credits (BIF 1,029.1 million) whereas the middle term financing decreased by BIF 11,961.7 million.

The Net Foreign Assets (BIF 149,493.6 VS 168,005.5 million) decreased by BIF 18,511.9 million, or -11.0 p.c. between august 2013 and august 2014. Expressed in American dollars, the net exchange reserves dropped (- 11.5 p.c.), coming from USD 109.2 million to USD 96.6 million.

VI. EXTERNAL TRADE

the eight first months of 2014, the external trade was characterized by an increase of the exports (+ 24.7 p.c.), against a decline of imports (-11.2 p.c.), compared to the same period of year 2013. Therefore, the trade balance registered an alleged deficit (BIF667,900.5 vs 784,080.7 million).

Exports

The cumulative exports until August 2014 increased both in value and in volume; from BIF 79,244.4 to 98,796.2 million and from 31,016 to 48,986 Tons respectively.

In value, this rise is attributed both to primary commodities (BIF 62,386.4 vs 55,793.8 million), and manufactured products (BIF 36,409.8 vs 23,450.6 million).

The increase of primary commodities concerned essentially the coffee (29,876.9 vs 18,728.2 BIF million), the cotton (BIF 94.3 vs 1.0 million), and cattle hides (BIF 4,551.1 vs 2,401.9 million).

Regarding the manufactured products, their value increase resulted in good performances realized by export of beers (BIF 5,234.0 vs 2,203.7 million), dark green bottles (BIF 171.9 vs 46.3 million), wheat flour (BIF 6,277.4 vs 44.0 million), and other manufactured products (BIF 13,667.4 vs 7,765.9 million).

Imports

Compared to those of the same period of 2013, the cumulative imports decreased by 11.2 p.c. in value, coming back from BIF 863,325.7 to 766,696.7 million, whereas they rose by 8.4 p.c. in volume, increasing from 487,521 to 528,406 Tons.

In value, this decline concerned all categories of goods: intermediary goods decrease by 7.6 pc, capital goods and consumption goods by 39.7 and 1.7 pc respectively.

The decline of import of intermediary goods concerned mainly the metallurgy goods (BIF 30,632.2 vs 38,677.2 million), agriculture and livestock goods (BIF 28,261.6 vs 29,436.6 million), food industry (43,647.8 vs 52,527.2 BIF million), construction products (BIF 28,688.3 vs 29,436.6 million) and other intermediary products especially mineral oil (BIF 171,281.5 vs 174,277.3 million).

For capital goods, the decrease is due to the decline of imports of boilers, construction equipment (BIF 40,215.3 vs 88,572.9 million), as well as tractors, vehicles, and transport unit (BIF 33,974.8 vs 86,382.9 million).

The imports of consumption goods fall due to the decline in supply of non-durable goods by BIF -37,749 million, whereas the imports of durable goods have increased by BIF 33,277.9 million.

However, the volume of imports during the first eight months in 2014 rose by 8.4 p.c. especially because of the increase of consumption goods (+38.3 p.c. and of equipment goods (+5.9 p.c.) in terms of volume; that have offset the decline of the volume of imports of the intermediary goods (- 2.5 p.c.).

VII. EXCHANGE RATE

In August 2014, the average exchange rate established to BIF 1,547.64 against 1,538.46 per US dollar recorded at the corresponding period of previous year; say a depreciation of 0.6 p.c.

At the end of august 2014, the BIF depreciated by 0.62 p.c. (BIF 1,547.90 per US dollar vs BIF 1,539.10 per US dollar) compared to the end of the same period 2013.

METHODOLOGICAL NOTES

I. PRODUCTION AND SALE OF SOME PRODUCTS

TABLES I.1.& I.2. Production of Arabica coffee by campaign and statement of sales

The two tables provide information on the cumulative production of parchment and machined coffee by campaign and the statement of sale contracts. They are established from data on coffee sector sent monthly by the coffee company (ARFIC).

TABLE I.3.& I.4. Production of tea leaves and dried tea, monthly sales in quantity, value and prices

These tables show the harvest of tea leaves, the production of dry tea and the dry tea sales. They are derived from the monthly activity reports assigned by the Burundi Tea Authority.

TABLE I.5. Production of the main industries

This table is elaborated from data collected from the main industrial enterprises. The productions are regrouped within the food, chemical and materials of construction industries.

TABLE I.6. Weighted index of the industrial production

The table indicates the relative proportion of the weighted index of food, chemical, textile and other industries in the general index of the industrial production.

This index is computed on basis of the weighting coefficients representing the contribution of each product in the total added value of the branch. These coefficients are extracted from results of the survey carried out in 1989 on commercial and industrial enterprises.

TABLES I.7 & I.8. Production and consumption of electric energy

The table I.7 shows the national production of electricity by hydroelectric power station. The table I.8 indicates the electric energy consumption by main urban centers. These data are provided by REGIDESO.

II. MONEY AND CREDIT

II.1. COVERAGE

II.1.1. Central Bank

The Central Bank is a monetary authority whose fundamental functions are: define and implement monetary and exchange rate policies, to regulate and supervise financial sector, issue currency, manage international reserves as well as to provide loans to other deposit corporations under the charge of the Central Bank.

II.1.2. Commercial Banks

Commercial Banks are Institutions that collect demand deposits that can be transferred by check or used as any other direct or long term means of payment, they are also involved in credit operations.

Institutions registered as commercial banks until now are: Banque de Crédit de Bujumbura (BCB), Banque Commerciale du Burundi (BANCOBU), Inter Bank Burundi (IBB), Banque de Gestion et de Financement (BGF), Finalease Bank (FINBANK), Banque Burundaise pour le Commerce et l'investissement (BBCI), Diamond Trust Bank Burundi (DTB), Kenya Commercial Bank Burundi (KCB Bank Burundi), Cooperative for Rural Development Bank (CRDB Bank Burundi) and ECOBANK Burundi.

Data on DTB, KCB Bank Burundi LMT and CRDB Bank Burundi are integrated in commercial banks statistics since June 2009, July 2012 and December 2012 respectively.

II.1.3. Other Financial Intermediaries

As by their usual profession, the other financial intermediaries give loans. They are allowed to borrow without having neither counters nor accounts for the clientele. The institutions registered in this category are Banque Nationale pour le Développement Economique (BNDE) and Fonds de Promotion de l'Habitat Urbain (FPHU).

II.1. CONTENTS OF TABLES

TABLE II.1.FOREIGN EXCHANGE RESERVES

Foreign exchange reserves are given by the sum of foreign assets of the BRB and Commercial Banks minus their external liabilities. The external reserves of the Central Bank regard only the foreign exchange reserves that the Bank can freely have at its disposal including foreign currencies, monetary Gold, SDR and the IMF reserve position in IMF.

TABLES II.2.1 & II.2.2.Balance sheet of BRB

The table shows the Central Bank's balance sheet as stated at the end of each month. In the liabilities side, this statement shows all the liabilities of the Central Bank as monetary authority while the assets side indicates the counterparts of those liabilities. The item "foreign assets" includes among others, demand and time deposits, currencies, IMF reserve position which is the difference between Burundi's share in the IMF (the account IMF n°1) and IMF securities account.

TABLES II.3.1 & II.3.2 Balance sheet of commercial banks

The tables show the consolidation of balance sheets of all commercial banks.

TABLES II.4.1 & II.4.2. Monetary survey

The Tables indicate the consolidation of assets and liabilities of BRB, commercial banks and Postal Checking Accounts. The asset represents counterparts of broad money (M2) which are: net foreign assets and domestic credit. In turn, liability shows broad money and net other items.

TABLES II.5.Base money, broad money and evolution of the money multiplier

The table shows the evolution of base money and its counterparts, broad money (M2) and money multiplier, which is the ratio between broad money and monetary base.

TABLES II.6.1 & II.6.2. Consolidated balance sheet of other financial intermediaries

The tables show the consolidation of assets and liabilities of BNDE and FPHU.

TABLES II.7.1 & II.7.2. Consolidated balance sheet of financial system

The tables denote the consolidation of monetary survey and consolidated statement of other financial intermediaries.

TABLE II.8. Liquidity of the banking sector

The table indicates autonomous factors of the banking liquidity which appear on the balance sheet of the BRB. Autonomous factors are those beyond direct control of Central Bank.

TABLE II.9. Banking deposits by holder

The table informs on deposits broken down by term and holder. These deposits are used to calculate broad money.

TABLE II.10.Breakdown of time deposits and other resources of commercial banks

The table shows the evolution of all time deposits and other resources of commercial banks by term.

TABLE II.11. Evolution of financial system risks

The table highlights the outstanding credits to economy (including unpaid loans) and signature commitments of commercial banks and financial establishments. Loans are divided in category and term.

TABLE II.12.Ventilation of loans by sector of activity

The table indicates the evolution of credits according to activity sectors.

TABLE II.13. Ventilation of loans and risks by term

The table highlights the stock of credits by term and specifies for each performing and non-performing loans.

TABLES II.14 & II.15. Average deposit and lending interest rates applied by commercial banks

The tables inform on weighted average interest rates paid and received by commercial banks on credits and interest bearing deposits.

TABLE II.16. Clearing house activities

The table shows, for each month, the number of transactions and the total amount carried out by the clearing house. Data are obtained by summing daily data.

TABLE II.17. Weighted Average interest rates of public securities at the end of period

It indicates, by term, the average interest rate of treasury securities registered at the end of each period.

TABLE II. 18. Refinancing rate at the end of period

The table indicates the refinancing rates applied by Central Bank at the end of period.

The table indicates all the budget revenues (tax and nontax) as well as grants provided to the Government by external partners (current and capital grants).

The table shows the Government's expenditures in two main components:

- Capital expenditures (called also investment expenditures).

TABLE III.3.Overall financial operations

The table shows the synthesis of Government Resources and Expenditures. It indicates the overall balance (deficit and its financing or surplus and its allocation).

TABLE III.4. Domestic debt

The table shows the outstanding domestic debt by creditor and type of loans.

TABLE III.5. External debt operations

The table shows the external financing operations (drawings, interest payment and principal repayment as well as revaluation).

TABLE III.6. External debt by Creditor

The table shows the main bilateral and multilateral creditors.

TABLE III.7. : Evolution of external debt by economic sectors

The table shows the allocation of external financing in various economic sectors.

TABLE III.8. : Evolution of external debt by economic sectors in percentage

The table shows the share of each sector in the allocation of external financing.

TABLE III.9. : Schedule of external debt servicing

The table indicates the amount to be paid as external debt service (interest and repayments).

IV. FOREIGN TRADE

The compilation of foreign trade statistics refers to the elaboration of tables of imports (in volume and value CIF) and exports (in volume and value FOB Bujumbura) of goods and services.

Tables of imports and exports are set according:

1. The nomenclature of the International Convention on the Harmonized Commodity Description and Coding System.

2. Destination sectors of imports (consumption, equipment and production) and the nature of export products (Primary, manufacturing and others).

3. Countries of origin for imports and countries of destination for the exports.

Statistics on foreign trade are elaborated from customs data, coffee auction and sale contracts for tea side.

4. International transactions include all transactions between residents and non-residents according to the Manual of the balance of payments (BPM6).

V. MISCELLANEOUS STATISTICS

TABLEV.1. Traffic in the port of Bujumbura

The table shows the traffic in the port of Bujumbura by gross volume of entries and exits of goods.

TABLE V.2: Entries and exits of goods in the port of Bujumbura

In relation to the previous table, this table shows the evolution on five years, of entries and exits of goods (in volume) in the port of Bujumbura. Entries are grouped in food, chemical and textile industries, fuel and lubricants, equipment materials, vehicles and other products.

TABLE V.3: Traffic in the international airport of Bujumbura

The table gives the traffic (arrivals and departures not including the transit) in the international Airport of Bujumbura. It shows the number of passengers, the tonnage of the baggage and freight as well as the volume of the postal mail.

TABLES V.4, V.5. & V.6.: Entries, consumption and stock of the main oil products

These tables inform respectively on the volume of entries, the consumption and the available stock of fuel, petrol, gas oil and J.P.1 in the Company of storage of Oil Products "SEP".

Table V.7. Price statistics

Statistics on prices are compiled on the basis of surveys of prices carried out by ISTEEBU on different markets of Bujumbura Capital. The food basket consists of items divided into eight groups as follows:

1. Foodproducts and soft drinks;
2. Alcoholic drinks and tobacco;
3. Clothing and footwear;
4. Housing, water, electricity, gas and other fuels;
5. Furnishings, household equipment and routine household maintenance

6. Health;
7. Transport;
8. Communication;
9. Leisure
10. Education;
11. Hotel, cafes and restoration
12. Other goods and services.

This classification was adopted in December 2013 to comply with international classification (COICOP).

TABLES V.8, V.9 and V.10: Statistics of exchange rate

Statisticson exchange rates coverthe main currencies quoted with uncertainty bythe Central Bank. The Research and Statistics department uses exchange rates and price index of the various partners of Burundi in the calculation of nominal and real effective exchange rates of Burundi Franc.
